Conflicts with wildlife species are a reality









But let's put them into the right context:

Most of the damages are made by species which are
not covered by the EU Nature Directives
(wild boars, deers)

And most attacks to humans actually come from domestic species (dogs, cows)



Need to properly address conflicts caused by protected species by using all available tools under the current legal/policy framework

Much knowledge and experience available

 EU legislation offers the required flexibility and support





Nature Directives' Fitness Check: The directives are fit for purpose, but implementation should be improved


Measures will be taken at EU level, but Member States and stakeholders concerned will also need to act, with increased support and assistance from the European Commission




Coexistence with Large Carnivores

- Sharing the landscapes with wildlife and predators
- Addressing the conflicts (prevention, mitigation, compensation, management)
- Derogations possible for strictly protected species (Commission guidance to be updated)
- Support by the Commission: LIFE, Rural Development, adhoc contracts, Stakeholders' Platforms (at EU and regional level), regular work with Member States (guidance, working groups, bio-geographic seminars, bilateral dialogue)

EU Platform on Coexistence between People and Large Carnivores






Platform's principles

- 1. To work within the EU legal framework, the Habitats Directive;
- 2. To ensure the necessary knowledge base;
- 3. To recognize socio-economic and cultural considerations and concerns;
- 4. To find solutions to conflicts through constructive dialogue;
- 5. To engage in trans-boundary cooperation.



Platform's activities

- Organised <u>events</u> such as an annual meeting and regional workshops;
- Gathered <u>case studies</u> demonstrating good practice in a range of Member States;
- Researched the use of <u>Rural Development funds</u> in supporting coexistence;
- Collected reports to form a <u>library</u> of references;
- Produced a <u>Platform communication plan</u>;
- Produced a <u>leaflet to present the Platform</u> and a <u>leaflet on</u>
 <u>use of Rural Development funds</u>.
